

Adelaide since 1889; *b.* Castle Caulfield, Co. Tyrone, Ireland, Jan. 6, 1853, eldest surviving son of the late Rev. R. Hamilton, Rector of Drumcree, Co. Armagh, and *ed.* Royal School Dungannon, Grammar School Dundalk, and Trinity Coll. Dublin. He studied medicine at Trinity Coll. Royal Coll. of Surgeons Dublin, and Adelaide Hospital, gaining in Adel. Hosp. all clinical prizes in medicine, surgery, and gynaecology, and the Knagges Prize. In pursuit of the specialities which he is now practising he studied ophthalmology under Professor Swanzy at Dublin, and subsequently was at Moorfields Ophthalmic Hospital London and Golden Square Throat Hospital, and completed his special studies in Berlin under Professors Hirschberg, Scholer, Uhloff, Frankel, and Luca. In 1888 he was elected a member of the Ophthalmological Society of the United Kingdom. He was in practice in Co. Armagh, Ireland, 1876-9, and in Laura, S.A., 1880-9. He was Hon. Surgeon to the Throat Dept. Adelaide Hospital 1890-6, President of the S.A. branch of the British Medical Assn. 1895, Vice-President of the Eye, Ear, and Throat section at Interstate Medical Congress at Brisbane 1899, and President of the same section at Hobart Congress 1902. He is President of the Medical Board of S.A. and a Director of the Australian Mutual Provident Society at Adelaide. Owns Willa Willa, Belair. *m.* 1st, Chennie, 2nd *d.* of Edward D. Atkinson, Co. HAMPTON, Henry George, Under Secretary for Law Western Australia since 1901; *b.* Tunbridge Wells, Eng., May 10, 1870, *s.* of George Essex Hampton, Comptroller-General W.A., and *g. s.* of John Stephen Hampton, Governor of W.A. 1862, *ed.* Brighton Coll., Eng., and Lausanne, Switzerland. Arrived in W.A. 1890. *m.* 1895, daughter of R. D. Hardey. *Recreations*—Golf, motoring, fishing. *Address*—18 Victoria Avenue, Perth.

HANCOCK, Henry Lipson, General Manager of Wallaroo and Moonta Mining and Smelting Co. Ltd.; *b.* Moonta Mines, Mar. 1867, *s.* of Henry Richard Hancock (q.v.), *ed.* Prince Alfred Coll., and studied at Ballarat Sch. of Mines, of which he is Associate. Member of Council of Moonta Sch. of Mines. M.Am.I.M.E. New York, A.M.I.C.E., and M.A.I.M.E. *m.* 1893. *Address*—Wallaroo, S.A.

HANCOCK, Henry Richard, 84 years Chief Superintendent of Moonta Copper Mines and concurrently General Manager of Wallaroo Mines for 22 years, inventor of "the Hancock jig;" served Moonta Mines previously as surveyor and assayer, and altogether a mining officer for 50 years, retired from mine management some years ago; *b.* Devon, Eng., 1836. Foundation member A.I.M.E. and Vice-Pres. for 3 years. Helped to establish the Moonta School of Mines. *e. s.* is General Manager of Wallaroo and Moonta Mines, 2nd *s.* is general manager of Parramatta and Yelta Mines. *Recreations*—Driving, agriculture. *Address*—Nalyappa, Moonta, S.A.

HARDMAN, Richard, Deputy Postmaster-General Western Australia; *b.* Western Aus-

tralia, 1848. He joined the Imperial Dept. at Perth in 1865, and two years later entered the Postal Dept., where he has been ever since, with the exception of a short period in the Customs service. He was Postmaster at York 1873-98, and promoted to Inspector in 1898. Two years later he was appointed Chief Inspector, and on the retirement of R. A. Sholl assumed control of the department, and was appointed to his present office in Feb. 1905. *Address*—Perth.

HARDY, Thomas, head of Thomas Hardy and Sons Ltd., wine merchants; *b.* Devon, Eng., 1830. Arrived in Aust. 1850, and planted vines at Bankside, nr. Adelaide, in 1853. A pioneer of the raisin and currant growing industry in Aust., one of the largest producers and shippers of wine and a successful exhibitor of wines throughout the world. Owns Bankside, Tintara, Aldinga, and Glen Hardy vineyards. Was President of S.A. Chamber of Manufactures 1896 and 1897, and Royal Agricultural Soc. 1897, and has been a member of the Council of the latter body for 40 years. *m.* 1852. *Address*—Currie St., Adelaide.

HARE, Frederick Arthur, Commissioner of Police Western Australia since Apr. 1904; *b.* Exmouth, Devonshire, Jan. 20, 1852, *s.* of Gustavus G. O. Hare, of Herstoncombe, Eng., *ed.* St. Columba's Coll., Wicklow. Arrived in Aust. 1870. Was Clerk and Asst. Private Secretary to Governor Sir William Robinson in W.A. 1880-2, Inspector of Police 1882-6, Private Secretary and A.D.C. to Governor Sir Frederick Broome, Acting Govt. Resident, Albany, and Govt. Resident Cambridge Gulf 1886-8; Resident Magistrate at York 1888-96, and Warden of East Coolgardie goldfields 1896-1900. *Club*—Wald. *Address*—St. George's Terrace, Perth.

HARMER, Rt. Rev. John Reginald, D.D., Bishop of Adelaide from 1895 to 1905, and translated to the See of Rochester early in 1905; *b.* Maise more Vicarage, Gloucester, Aug. 11, 1857, *s.* of the late Rev. George Harmer, M.A., Vicar of Maise more. He was Editor of Bishop Lightfoot's posthumous works, also Apostolic Fathers (1891). *m.* 1895, Mary Dorothy Somers-Cocks, *d.* of the late Arthur Herbert Cocks, C.B. *Residence*—Satis House, Rochester, England.

HARNEY, Hon. Edward Augustine, Senator for Western Australia in first Federal Parl. 1901-3. Is a barrister and solicitor. *Address*—Cathedral Avenue, Perth.

HARPER, Andrew, M.A. (Melb.), D.D. (Edin.), Principal of St. Andrew's College within the University of Sydney since 1901, and Hunter Baillie Professor of Hebrew there; *b.* Glasgow, Nov. 13, 1844, *s.* of Robert Harper, *ed.* Glasgow Acad., Scotch Coll. Melb., Universities of Melb. and Edin., New Coll. Edin., and Univ. of Berlin. Arrived in Aust. in 1856. Was Principal and Head Master of the Presbyterian Ladies' Coll. Melb. 1877-87, Warden of the Senate of the Univ., member of Univ. Council, and Professor of Hebrew in the Theological Hall Ormond Coll., Melbourne. *Author* of Deuteronomy in the Expositors' Bible, Songs of Solomon in the Cambridge Bible for Schools,
